President, VP-1 POPs





Until . . . Saturday night, during the impromptu pool party at the Comfort Inn, Gene let the cat out of the bag. It seems Gene was born (*are there any witnesses still around?*) in 1927, three years before our honored ex-C.O. His Washington State Driver's License and military I D card were accepted as legal proof.

How many of you knew that, while still a wet behind the ears youngster, Gene served in the U. S. Merchant Marine during Word War Two? His ship was torpedoed and sunk by a Nazi submarine and he spent 22 days bobbing around in a life raft. Gene and his mates were finally rescued by a British aircraft carrier, H.M.S. Activity. He's still an active member of the World War Two Merchant Marine Association. Gene says, "age wise, I'm just a kid at their meetings".

PASSINGS

Robert "Bob" Moilanen passed away on January 3, 1999. His sister, Kathy, said that he suffered from diabetes and endured a tough struggle with his illness. Bob was an "AW" in VP-1. He flew with crew-3 (Lcdr Bob Verwers, AWC Jim Harvey, AE1 Mike Kelleigh, et al.)

The first Master Chief Petty Officer of the Navy (MCPON) **Del Black** passed away in early March 2000 at the age of 77. Shipmate Black set the standard for the Senior Enlisted Advisor position, serving as MCPON from 1967 until he retired in 1971.

DidJaNo: In February 1959, the Navy awarded Lockheed a contract to develop a replacement for the aging P2V Neptune. (*The "aging" P2V had then been in the Navy inventory about 13 years*). The P3V Orion, derived from Lockheed's successful L188 Electra airliner, entered the Navy's inventory in July 1962, and almost 40 years later it remains the Navy's sole land-based, long-range, antisubmarine warfare and maritime patrol aircraft. It has gone through one designation change (P3V to P-3) and three major models: P-3A, P-3B, and P-3C, the latter being the only one now in active service. The last U. S. Navy P-3 came off the production line at the Lockheed plant in April 1990. Fifteen nations now use the P-3 as their maritime patrol aircraft.

SWAP APPROVED

I'm not really the guy who should be sharing the next reunion with you. The guy who should be there is Leslie Squires. Les and I went through recruit training together at RTC Orlando, Florida; then basic aviation training, and AME "A"

school at Naval Air Technical Training Center, Memphis, Tennessee.

From the very moment we learned about the different types of naval aircraft and where they were based Les wanted a Patrol Squadron out of Hawaii. It was all he ever talked about — his big desire. Me, I wanted a fighter or attack squadron on the East Coast. The type of squadron didn't matter as long as it was carrier based.

I had an uncle in the Merchant Marine and my stepfather had been an Aviation Gunner and air crewman during the Second World War. He had flown off the USS Lexington during the invasion of Okinawa. As a youngster I made several pilgrimages with him to Pensacola so he could see the mighty "Lex" once again. On one of these trips we stopped off for a tour of the battleship USS Alabama on Mobile bay. I must have been about 8 or 9 years old at the time, and was totally fascinated by the big ship and all the things that were on it. It's a fascination I was never able to get over. I couldn't wait to go aboard a ship.

Les and I were both assigned to AME "A" school in the fall of 1971. The training was not hard for me. In fact I sort of breezed through it, becoming a class leader. One of the perks at AME "A" school was that the students were able to select their first duty station from a list of assignments sent from the detailers. About the last week of "A" school we walked into our classroom to find 7 sets of orders written on the chalkboard. At the top of the list was VP-1, at Barbers Point, Hawaii. As soon as he saw the board Les let out a cry and just about had a fit.

To back track a little, it seems that while we were going through training in Memphis Les had been able to go home on quite a few weekends. And, while he was there on his home turf, he had fallen in love. Seeing those orders for VP-1 on the board he was heart broken. It was just what he had wanted — but now, being smitten, Hawaii was just too far away from his new fiancée. I don't remember if Les actually cried right there in class, but if not he was very close to tears.

Les was so upset that he approached the Petty Officer in charge of our class and pleaded with him to get out of having to take the orders to VP-1. The First Class Petty Officer told Les that the only way he could get out of those orders was to find a classmate with a similar EAOS who would swap with him. That's where I came in. As I said before, Les and I had gone through recruit training together. Our

EAOS was within 3 days of each other. And, by that time, I didn't care where I went as long as it was warm most of the time. The PO1 took me aside and told me VP-1 was the best set of orders on the board. I'd almost be assured of going to the Philippines for long periods of time. Meanwhile a couple of other Petty Officers were trying to console Les.

But Les was desperate. He was in love and he wasn't going to let anything stand in the way of true love, even if it meant giving up his dream of serving with a Patrol Squadron in Hawaii. So I agreed to take the orders to VP-1. Les and I had to talk to the Master Chief in charge of AME "A" school to see if he could square away the swap in orders. A little later that day the word came down from topside that the swap had been approved.

During my remaining time at "A" school I was called up to the front of the class and made to stand at attention for lengthy periods. The instructors said that this was to toughen me up — for I was going to be working for one of the meanest, roughest, toughest Chief AMEs in the fleet. None other than the notorious **AMEC Mike "GRUMPY" Taylor**.

After "A" school graduation I never saw Les again. But, I did add him to the list of people I cussed while I was up in a P-3 wheel well changing an HRD bottle. But Les was right to be upset because by not accepting his orders to VP-1 he missed the opportunity to be associated with some of the finest people I've ever known. I'll always consider myself one of the luckiest men alive for having the chance to serve with "The Fleet's Finest", VP-1. And, especially with Chief Taylor, who taught me more than he'll ever realize.

DidJaNo: The U. S. Navy gave Lockheed a contract to design a P-7A to replace the P-3C way back in 1990. The P-7A was to look similar to the P-3C but with a slightly longer fuselage, wider wings, new propulsion systems, and updated avionics. But, due to the high design engineering costs (*and probably the end of the cold war*) the contract was canceled.

trickled down from the C.O.'s office to the club staffs, and were made a part of their official employment records.



ONE".



DidJaNo: The United States Customs Service P-3 Maritime Surveillance Service site at Jacksonville is now in operation. BuNo 155299 was transferred to Jax on 9 Feb from Corpus Christi. This is the first operational USCS P-3 to be assigned to Jacksonville's Naval Air Station. This site will eventually be home to eight USCS P-3 aircraft. Currently, the aircraft will return to Corpus Christi, TX, for Phase Inspections and any planned heavy maintenance.

(Our Jack Bachhofer, a Jax area resident, recently informed me that it looks like the 8 USCS P-3 aircraft originally planned for NAS Jax might turn into 16 converted Orions. Also, a new USCS aircraft hangar is being constructed at NAS Jacksonville.)

The Corpus Christi USCS office reported that a new Infrared Detecting Set named *Star Sapphire* made by Flir Systems Incorporated was installed into U.S. Customs' P-3 BuNo 151390. ASSOCIATION DUES
