WHERE — Millington, Tennessee. Just a tad north of Memphis, where the Naval Aviation Technical Schools command was once located.


WHEN — The weekend of September 12, 13, and 14, 2003. Come early — stay late. Enjoy!



that operate Navy Lodges (there are some of these also available at NSA).

Navy Inns are former senior enlisted bachelor quarters that have been turned into rentals. We think you'll enjoy staying at this facility. Gather your old crew, shop, close friends, etc., and request to stay together. The NSA Navy Inns have agreed to try and work with you.

The rooms are divided into quads, four separate large bedrooms with a shared separate living room. Each bedroom has a head with shower, TV connected to cable, a VCR, an iron and ironing board, refrigerator, hair dryer, microwave oven, and free local phone service. These rooms are limited to two persons due fire regulations, so if you plan on bringing grandma, or the grandkids, plan on renting two rooms or request to stay at the Navy Lodge.

There are six VIP rooms at this Navy Inn, (anyone can stay in one of these VIP rooms). These have kitchenettes, but are still two person rooms. There is a nice breakfast area which we expect will be the location of our duty office (hospitality room).

This is a several building complex that houses most of the Navy's selection boards that meet here frequently. In fact, there should be two boards in session while we are here. Between the buildings are courtyards for visiting, along with grills should your mini-group want to have their own cook-out while here. I've heard that the CPO selection boards throw some great parties while staying at this Navy Inn.

The Navy Exchange has washers and dryers, vending machines, and the like at this site. For those of you that have had a duty tour here in the past, the Navy Inns are located just inside the main gate off Navy Road.

We have arrangements worked out with security to get those of you without government decals on your vehicles, including rental cars, aboard the base. So, hopefully, that won't be a problem.

Room prices are listed at the end of this article. As per our reunion committee agreement with Navy Inns you will have 60 days after this newsletter hits the street to have a good chance to be housed with the majority. After that, you might be in the other Navy Inns facility aboard NSA. Of course Navy needs will always have priority. As there are 162 rooms plus the VIP rooms at this location, we are crossing

our fingers that we can all be housed together.

Our group events are planned. We'll have a Friday evening sit-down dinner (\$12 per person); a Saturday afternoon BBQ and fish fry (\$10 per person; and a Sunday morning brunch \$10 per person). Children under 12 years of age may attend our group events for half price. If you plan to have youngsters under age 12 in your party be sure to note this on your registration form.


The registration fee is \$3 per person attending

the reunion. So, not counting your room cost for which you'll personally be responsible to the Navy Inns folks, if you attend all events the total expense per person would be \$35. Only seventy bucks for a couple! Unbelievable!

A word on attire so y'all can plan what to bring along. We'll be dressing casual for all events, just as we did at Pensacola. No tie, no tails, no top hats, no cummerbunds. Ladies can dress to the nines if they desire — or wear blue jeans. Jackets for men optional, but definitely not required. Remember, though, we'll be having photos taken on Friday evening for the reunion memory book. If planning to attend in your long johns, I'd upgrade.

The best time for our avid golfers to play a round will be on Saturday morning, unless arriving early or staying over a day or two after the festivities. Be sure to mark "golf" on your registration form if you plan to play. As one would expect with two Admirals aboard NSA Mid-South, the golf course is well maintained. The course also gets a lot of play by selection board members when boards are in session here.

The food situation was the focus of a great deal of discussion and planning by our reunion committee members. We finally decided to go with our usual sit-down dinner on Friday evening. This succulent repast will be held at the Helmsman Complex aboard NSA. Attitude adjustment hour will commence at 1800 with dinner scheduled at 1900. A cash bar will be set-up in the banquet room. The banquet menu will include salad, roast beef, parsley buttered new potatoes, green beans almandine, rolls, butter, ice tea, and coffee. Our reunion committee will provide a festively decorated cake. After we fill our tummies we'll have a short welcoming address by the "Memphis Mafia", then provide our former C. O.'s with an opportunity to say a few wise words. This dinner will be held in the complex ball-room. Our bartender there will be on duty from 1800 'till the last dog dies.

The Helmsman Complex is a joint use facility aboard NSA Mid-South that houses an Officers Club (open on Friday nights only), a CPO club (open every day), and an Enlisted Men's Club (open only by request). It's the only club aboard the base. The complex serves a buffet lunch every week day.

Our Saturday gathering will begin at 1200 at the Navy Lake recreation area on "North Side". That's the area on the North side of Navy Road that once was a part of the base. That area is now the property of the City of Millington. But, the Navy Lake area is managed by NSA's Morale Welfare and Recreation (MWR) Department. Go figure. We'll begin Saturday afternoon by remembering our departed squadron mates. Then we'll chow-down — thrilling our taste buds with a good-old down-home southern fish fry and Memphis style BBQ. We have Reserved, for our exclusive use, both the big Lake House and a large outdoor picnic area.



This picnic area is also the location of the RV campground. Those with motor homes or campers can walk on over to our Saturday doings.

MWR has volleyball nets, horseshoe pits and paddle boats to use/rent. Enjoy some great chow and a leisurely afternoon with your squadron mates and their ladies.

Our Sunday brunch will be ready at 1000, again at the Helmsman Complex. This breakfast buffet will consist of orange juice scrambled eggs, bacon, sausage patties, hash browns, grits, sausage gravy and biscuits, and, of course, good hot coffee. After feasting on all the available goodies, we'll enjoy a short talk by our guest speaker. We're currently speaking with the NSA people and the Navy Personnel Command (old BuPers) about a speaker. More on that later. The next item on the agenda is our VP-1 P-3 Orion Pioneers business meeting. The meeting will be called to order by President Hanson after our speaker completes his/her presentation.

We all should have ample time to visit with our friends and squadron-mates of long ago, and also to see some of the local sites, especially if you can arrange to arrive a day or two early or stay over a bit after the our scheduled festivities. Our group events are scheduled for Friday evening, Saturday afternoon, and Sunday morning. Unscheduled time is all day Friday; Saturday morning and evening; and Sunday afternoon and evening. Lots of free time to visit with old acquaintances, crewmembers, work-mates, and also see some local attractions.

man complex. Military/retiree ID card holders will be able to get discounted tickets to most all attractions in this area. Ever been to the famous Memphis mansion, "Graceland"? Graceland is located on U. S. highway 51 in South Memphis; a short ride from our reunion headquarters at Millington.

Might you have an interest in old tractors? — hit and miss engines? — arts & crafts? The City of Millington has scheduled "goat days" at the USA stadium over the same weekend as our reunion. (See the inset article on the next page). The price is right — nothing. You might even like to try their famous (or infamous) goat BBQ.

The Millington chamber of commerce is preparing info packets for everyone attending our reunion. These will be distributed at our "duty office".

"Tunica" a large casino just a bit south of Memphis, across the Mississippi state line. A big place with fine food, top-notch hotel accommodations, good shows, and, of course, all sorts of gambling.

The Memphis Convention and Visitors Bureau offers a tourism guide that includes a list of area campgrounds and information about various local attractions. You can contact them by writing to 47 UNION AVE., MEMPHIS, TN 38103; calling (800) 873-6282; or browsing on-line at WWW.MEMPHISTRAVEL.COM.

The base has a well stocked exchange, commissary, and mini mart, and a service station, so most things one might need are close at hand. There's a large military pharmacy located in the exchange, although military medical care for retirees is not available on the base.

Did I mention the complimentary breakfast at our Navy Inn? Juice, fruit, biscuits and sawmill gravy, cereal, sweet rolls, and hot coffee. It's been said that the sawmill gravy is so thick that one can hear the whistle toot.



Did I forget to mention the number to call for the Navy Inns? To reserve a room call 1-877-Navy Inn, (1-877-628-9466). That's a toll free number and you'll probably speak with Mrs. Carolyn J. Ragland if you phone-in during normal working hours. This number has a human on duty 24 hours a day. Have your credit card ready.

1903-2003

■ **April 3, 1903** — Millington, a rural community that grew up around a train depot, is incorporated. It is named for wealthy landowner George Millington, who donated much of the land.

■ **1914** — Millington Telephone Company, which still exists, has 50 town subscribers and 50 country subscribers. In 1928 the Howard family buys full ownership of the company.

■ **1939** — The new Strand Theatre, which has air conditioning, gives residents a cool place to watch second-run movies. Today the theater provides a place for gospel and country music shows.

■ **1940** — Census shows population at 730, up from 554 in 1910.

■ **April 17, 1942** — The United States condemns and buys 2,179 acres east of Millington at a cost of \$203,601 to establish the Naval Reserve Aviation Base.

■ **December 1949** — Millington residents begin receiving door-to-door mail delivery.

■ **1950** — Census shows Millington is the fastest-growing city in Tennessee with a population of 4,696.

■ **Dec. 25, 1987** — Flood causes great damage in Indian Meadows area. Though the city hasn't seen such a flood since, officials are still looking for ways to improve flood control in Millington.

moving the Naval Training Station — and more than 9,000 military and civilian jobs — to Pensacola.

■ **1995** — City officials take the unusual step of using taxpayer funds to develop White Oak subdivision in an effort to generate more upscale housing.

■ **1998** — The Bureau of Personnel officially opens its headquarters at the Millington base, replacing the Naval Training Station. The naval base now has about 3,900 military and civilian jobs.

■ **2000** — Census counts only 10,433 residents.

■ **2001** — Millington hosts popular VESTA Home Show, a sign to Mayor George R. Harvell Jr. and other city leaders that Millington is changing its image from Navy town to up-and-coming suburb.

■ **April 3, 2003** — The city's 100th birthday party to include renaming of Eastwood Park on Navy Road to Centennial Park.

■ **1990** — Census shows Millington with 17,866 residents. That fall, W.S. 'Babe' Howard, local entrepreneur and philanthropist, starts Goat Days Festival at his USA Stadium.

■ **1993** — Base Realignment and Closure Commission (BRAC) recommends







answer has been asked about by many of our squadron-mates. We wonder why he hasn't taken part in any of our reunions. I don't know why. I can only venture a guess.




